Facts About Teachers

Why do teachers matter so much?

- > Studies prove that a great teacher can impart a year and a half's worth of learning to a student in one year.
- > Good teachers over a sustained periods can [help students] overcome the disadvantages of poverty.
- > Teachers work an average of ten hours per day and 1,927 hours per school year.

On U.S. societal views of teaching:

- ➤ <u>61% of U.S. adults</u> think teachers are underpaid given their level of training and importance to society.
- > 77% of U.S. adults feel teaching is among the most underappreciated professions in the U.S.
- ➤ A 2015 survey found that only <u>4.2% of college freshmen</u> are considering majoring in education, the lowest rate in 42 years.
- > 76% of U.S. adults agree that many of the smartest people in society don't go into teaching because being a teacher doesn't pay enough.

On teacher salaries:

- ➤ Only 4.7% of college juniors would consider teaching at the current starting salary. 68% of college students said they would consider the teaching profession if it paid 50% more than the current occupations they were considering.
- ➤ In 1970 in New York city, a starting lawyer going into a prestigious firm and a starting teacher going into public education had a differential in their entry salary of about \$2,000. Today, including salary and bonus, that starting lawyer makes \$160,000, while starting teachers in New York make roughly \$45,000.
- ➤ If teacher pay <u>had risen in proportion to per-pupil spending since 1970</u>, the average teacher would make more than \$120,000 today.
- The average starting salary for teachers in our country is <u>\$39,000</u>; the average ending salary after 25 years in the profession is \$67,000.
- ➤ As of 2015, teachers' weekly wages are <u>23% lower</u> than those of other college graduates.
- The wage gap between teachers who belong to a union and all other professions is -19.6%; for non-union teachers the wage gap jumps to -25.5%.
- > Teachers are <u>priced out of home ownership</u> in 32 metropolitan areas.
- > 99.5% of teachers reported spending their own money on their students or classrooms during the 2012-2013 school year. Of the \$3.2 billion spent overall on school supplies that year, \$1.6 billion came directly from teachers' pockets.

On teacher turnover:

- ➤ 46 % of teachers in public schools leave the profession within five years.
- ➤ In the next 10 years, more than 1.8 million of the 3.2 million teachers will become eligible for retirement.
- > 14% of teachers leave the profession each year; in urban districts, the turnover is higher: 20%.
- ➤ High turnover of American teachers costs our country over \$7 billion every year.
- ➤ Of teachers who leave the profession for reasons of dissatisfaction, <u>poor salaries are the cause for 61%</u>.
